LOTTIE MOON

- International missions offering began in 1888 by WMU
- Named after Lottie Moon in 1918
- 3,171 people groups remain unreached and unengaged
- 100% of offering supports missionaries who carry the gospel to the ends of the earth
- 3,515 missionaries supported and 155 countries served
- Offering taken at Christmas with Week of Prayer happening weeks prior to Christmas
- Over \$5 Billion given to date

ANNIE ARMSTRONG

- North American missions offering began in 1895 by WMU
- Named after Annie Armstrong in 1934
- Estimated 291 Million lost in North America
- 161 unreached people groups
- 100% of offering funds North American missionaries
- Offering taken at Easter with Week of Prayer happening before Easter week
- Over \$2 Billion given to date

MILDRED GOLDEN

- Tennessee missions Offering began in 1902 by TN WMU, led by Mildred Golden
- Offering named after W.C. & Mildred Golden in 1943
- The first offering received was \$800.
- Offering supports Tennessee ministries
- Offering taken between September 1-August 31
- Suggested Week of Prayer in September

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LOTTIE MOON

1840-1912

In 1873, Lottie Moon was appointed as a missionary to China. When she set sail for China, she was 32 years old. She spent nearly 40 years sharing the gospel with love, courage and unwavering faith chiefly in Tengchow and P'ingtu.

Throughout her years in China, Lottie wrote letters to the Foreign Mission Board (now the IMB) and to Baptist women asking for more missionaries and for money to grow her work in China.

Because of her determination, WMU collected a Christmas Offering to give to the Foreign Mission Board. In 1918, at Annie Armstrong's suggestion, WMU named the offering for Lottie Moon.

Today, we still give to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering in honor of her work and sacrifice to keep our missionaries on the field. 100% of your offering supports missionaries who carry the gospel to the ends of the earth.

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ANNIE ARMSTRONG

1850-1938

Annie Armstrong was born at a time when there was little opportunity for women. Yet, her devotion to Christ led her to a life of service and leadership. She organized women to pray, to give and to meet the needs around them.

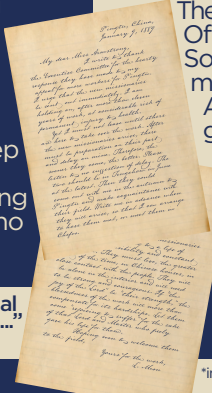
Annie was recognized as a national Southern Baptist trailblazer for her visionary leadership that still inspires millions today.

An offering began in 1895 by the WMU to benefit the work of the Home Mission Board (now NAMB). In 1934, it was named after Annie Armstrong.

The Annie Armstrong Easter Offering is the primary way Southern Baptists fund missions in North America. 100% of gifts given to AAEO go to the field to support more than 3,000 missionary families.

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MILDRED GOLDEN

1872-1953

Mildred Golden was corresponding secretary of Tennessee WMU from 1898-1902. She saw the need for a central offering to support Baptist missions efforts in Tennessee. She knew churches prayed for and gave to foreign missions and home missions during the year, and suggested a week of prayer and offering for state missions.

In 1902, W.C. and Mildred Golden led Tennessee Baptists to become the first state to observe a season of prayer for state missions and to contribute to a state missions offering. In 1943, the offering was renamed in their honor.

Today, the Golden Offering for Tennessee Missions is meeting human needs through Compassion Ministries, restoring communities after storms through Disaster Relief Ministries, sharing the hope of Christ on college campuses through Baptist Collegiate Ministries, and much more.

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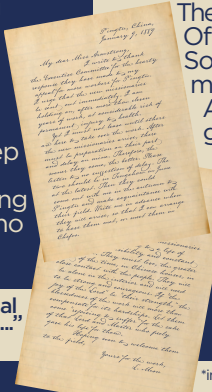
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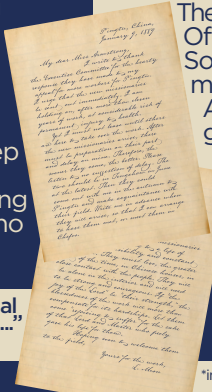
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
